### Presentation on graduate education at CSULB by Praveen Soni, Chair, University Graduate Council

Distribute the Graduate Studies Awareness Quiz and let everyone take it and commit to the answers. Then I start my presentation.

Usually in an advertisement, the fine print or affirmative disclosure appears at the end or the bottom of the advertisement. Even though this is a presentation, and not an advertisement, I would like to make an affirmative disclosure upfront.

Throughout my presentation, I will be making references to Outstanding/Shining graduate programs, faculty, students etc. These references are to be treated as representative of graduate education at CSULB, and not an exhaustive list. These are examples and samples, not the population. They are taken from submissions made to the Graduate Council by a variety of individuals in the University. No offense is directed toward any program, faculty, student, or entity if it is not mentioned in my presentation.

President Dr. Robert Maxson, Provost Dr. Gary Reichard, Academic Senate Chair-Dr. Wayne Dick, Ladies and Gentlemen,

On two occasions in the last month I have had the distinct pleasure of listening to speeches made by our wonderful President Dr. Robert Maxson. First was at the convocation and then later at the Academic Senate meeting last Thursday. In both these speeches, Dr. Maxson stated, and I quote,

"I have always felt that my mission as a university president is to advance the academic reputation of my institution. Plainly stated, the better the reputation of a university, the more valuable the degrees of the men and women who graduate from that university. We owe it to our students!"

I stand here before you today to talk about graduate studies at CSULB, and provide you a glimpse of how, in their own small way, graduate education is helping to advance the academic reputation of this university. Graduate programs at CSULB are many, diverse, large, vibrant, and I believe, very much at the core of the University's mission.

### Recognition and Impact

Many of our faculty, students, and programs have been recognized nationally and internationally, and have had significant impact on our communities.

A National Science Foundation study found that CSULB sends more students into Ph.D. programs in the sciences than any other non-PhD. granting institution in the country.

According to the latest report by the National Center for Education Statistics, CSULB ranked 19<sup>th</sup> in the Top 100 national list of colleges and universities awarding master's degrees nationwide to Hispanics. Eleven CSU campuses made the list with only San Diego State and Cal. State LA scoring a higher rank. CSU campuses were considered notably strong in Education, Mathematics, Psychology, and Public Administration.

Seventy five percent of all speech communication instructors in local area community colleges have received their MA degrees in communication studies, and teaching experience at CSULB. Without our graduate program, the local community college system in speech communication would suffer immeasurably. One hundred percent of the faculty at LBCC, have received their degrees from CSULB.

Professor Loganbill of the Department of Communication Studies has lectured by invitation around the globe. His research and teaching expertise has been sought, and personally acknowledged and congratulated by the Emperor and Empress of Japan, Queen Ingrid of Norway, Queen Silvia of Sweden, Queen Beatrix of the Netherlands, former president Ronald Reagan, Prince Andrew of England, and the Sultan of Brunei.

recognized poets who have won many awards and grants. Steve Cooper achieved national recognition for his biography of LA novelist and screenwriter John Fante. Fred Wegener is recognized as an Edith Wharton scholar, while Diane Vipond is recognized as a John Fowles scholar.

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Dr. RoseMarie Hoffman was presented the American Counseling Association's National Research Award in 2002.

Dr. Thomas Kampwirth of the post baccalaureate School Psychology program was awarded the National Association of School Psychologist lifetime achievement award in spring 2003. This highly selective honor is awarded once a year from a field of national nominations. Tom was a program coordinator for 25 years.

Dr. Robert Thayer of the Department of Psychology's most recent book, *Calm Energy*, has been the topic of many articles in the popular press area, including *Newsday*, *Saturday Evening Post*, *Reader's Digest*, *Physician and Sports Medicine*, and *USA Today*.

MaryEllen Vogt of the Graduate Reading Program is the Vice president of the International Reading Association. She will become President next year, while Lee Huff, a graduate of the School Psychology Program, was elected president of the National Association of School Psychologists.

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### State of the Art facilities

CSULB also has several 'state of the art' facilities to assist faculty and students in their quest for excellence and advance the academic reputation of the university. Among them are:

The Boeing laboratories housed and managed by the college of engineering that provide state of the art facilities for student and faculty research activities, including graduate theses and projects; the largest and finest university based dance facility in the country, and; The Department of Psychology houses the Center for Usability in Design and Assessment, which offers state of the art evaluation services, training in conducting and using usability evaluations, and information services including ADA compliance guideline information.

CSULB currently offers 66 masters degrees. In addition, we are immensely proud of the Master of Arts in Occupational Studies, which is the only master's degree unique to CSULB in the Southland. The number of degrees offered by CSULB, have remained relatively constant over the last 5-10 years. Several of our programs across the Colleges are accredited by national and regional organizations. Some noteworthy ones are:

The CSULB Graduate Reading program was the first fully accredited program in California. It has been described as "setting the gold standard" for programs in the state by the CA Commission on Teacher Credentialing.

The Graduate program in Communication Studies is ranked #1 in California and #8 in the country. These rankings are based upon research productivity brought about by the expertise of the faculty, the variety of the courses, the diversity of the student body, and the resources available to the faculty.

The Graduate program in Kinesiology and Physical Education currently houses over 100 graduate students and 10 options. It has the most number of students nationwide.

The Mechanical and Aerospace Engineering department had more than 1.5 million dollars in grants and contracts last year from Navy, Boeing, TRW, Department of Transportation, California Energy Commission, and other private agencies.

In addition to the masters programs, we currently offer two Ph.D. programs.

The Ed.D. Degree in Educational Administration and Leadership offered jointly with the University of California, Irvine began this fall. The joint Ph.D. program in Engineering and Applied Industrial Mathematics between the CSULB College of Engineering and Claremont Graduate School has had over 40 students with graduates obtaining tenure-track and lecturer positions at CSU and private university campuses and becoming president and senior engineers at private companies.

Now what was your answer to Question 3?

3. Name one terminal master's degree program offered by CSULB.

If you listed any of the Master of Fine Arts degrees, you were right.

All the Masters in Fine Arts degrees are terminal degrees. These are the MFA in Theatre Arts, MFA in Studio Art, MFA in Dance, and MFA in Creative Writing. The MFA in Theatre Arts – Concentration in Theatre Management, is accredited by the National Association of Schools of Theatre. It is one of only 10 accredited programs in the country.

The Edison theatre, an off campus theatre owned by the California Repertory Company affiliated with the Theatre Arts department is celebrating its 15<sup>th</sup> anniversary now. It has presented 28 world premieres, 19 American premieres, and 42 Southern California premieres.

The MFA program in Ceramics was named one of the top ten in the nation by *US News* and *World Report* for 2003-2004. Cindy Kolodziejski, a recent graduate in Ceramics, is currently, or will be showing her work at The American Craft Museum in New York, The Los Angeles County Art Museum, The National Museum of History, Taipei, Taiwan, The Shigaraki Ceramic Cultural Park in Shiga, Japan, and the Fourteenth International Biennial of Ceramic Art in Vallauris, France.

Graduates in Sculpture/Intermedia are exhibiting their works at the Japanese American National Museum, the California African American Museum, the Chinese American Museum and the Laguna Art Museum.

Professor Todd Gray of the Art department had his photographs exhibited last summer at the Oakland Museum of California.

The Master of Fine Arts in Dance – performance and choreography is a terminal degree and is unique to CSULB in the CSU system. The National Association of Schools of Dance accredits both the MFA and the MA in Dance degrees.

Dance Teacher Now ranks the Dance Department one of the "Top 10 in the nation" in a nationwide survey of university dance chairpersons.

Current MFA student Filip Condeescu won the National American College Dance Festival Outstanding Choreography Award.

Recent MFA in Dance graduate Holly Clark is dancing with the touring company Swing.

Recent MA in Dance graduate was named Teacher of the Year in the Santa Ana School District.

CSULB currently has over 3600 graduate students, and Master of Social Work is the largest, currently housing over 300 students. Since 1993-1994, the number of undergraduate students has increased steadily to over 30,000 now while the range of graduate students has been pretty tight, fluctuating from a low of 3416 to a high of 3794. The mix of graduate students in the student population stands at about 10.3%. In 1993-94, the mix was 14.5%, and it was at an all time high of 23.5% in 1977-78.

1993-94 was the first year when graduate admissions decisions were made at the program/department, and college levels rather than at the University level. An overall reduction in graduate students signifies, perhaps a more selective process by the

individual programs to admit better quality students. In a survey of Graduate Advisors conducted by Ron Vogel in fall 2001, and again by Beth Ambos in spring 2003, the graduate advisors felt there was a need to market their program (4.06 on a 5 point scale). This finding could be interpreted to mean that graduate advisors are interested in attracting better-qualified applicants to their programs, and thereby increasing either the quantity of students, or improving the admit rate, or both.

Another possible reason for a reduction in graduate students could be the elimination of differential funding by the state for graduate versus undergraduate students in 199?-9?.

How do graduate students enhance the reputation of the university while they are in residence? Let us look at a few examples.

Students in the MA in Philosophy program have individually and jointly presented papers at the most prestigious of the regular, annual philosophy meetings. These papers have undergone a rigorous double blind refereed process. They have also presented coauthored papers at International meetings in Beijing, UK, and Vienna.

Several students of the music program are professional orchestral performers (San Diego Symphony, Director of the Los Angeles Baroque Orchestra) and jazz players. Music graduates have also won awards at Regional Metropolitan Opera Finals and several European opera and piano competitions.

Scenic Design students have exhibited their work at Central St. Martins School of Design in London, and The State Dostoevsky Museum in St. Petersburg, Russia. In the summer, students will be participating in the Prague Quadrennial Scene Design Exhibition, the most prestigious event of its kind in the world.

Several RGRLL students have won prestigious scholarships for study abroad and presented papers at international conferences.

Two students from the Masters in Public Administration program were accepted as finalists for the internationally competitive Presidential Management Internship program. The program places students in the Federal Government for two years on an accelerated career path to upper management.

Aziz Bakkoury, a graduate student in the geography department has captained an event in the Science Olympiad this year.

Tadashi Murayama, a graduate student in the Mechanical and Aerospace Engineering Department (currently a Ph.D. student at UCI) won the 2nd place in CSU state student research competition.

Finally, how long do you think the students take to graduate?

7. What is the mean number of years required by master's students to graduate?

The mean number of years is 3.25 years, about half that of undergraduates. Graduate programs require between 30 and 60 units for graduation resulting in faster completion of programs. One in six students graduating from CSULB is a graduate student. To the extent that graduation rates contribute to the regional or national ranking of a university, masters programs are doing their share to improve those rankings.

Where do these graduates go, and what do they do after graduation? Clearly, they contribute as productive members of the society getting jobs, taking up careers, and joining Ph.D. programs in record numbers and becoming college/university professors. Here are a few examples.

Graduates of masters programs from across CSULB have entered Ph.D. programs around the country in universities such as the UC's, USC, Claremont Graduate School, Johns Hopkins, Emory, Purdue, Texas A&M, University of Houston, University of Minnesota, and University of Michigan to name a few. Recent music graduates have also been accepted into major doctoral programs in performance at Julliard, Manhattan School, Mannes School, Eastman, and the New England Conservatory.

Several of these students have finished their Ph.D. programs and are occupying tenure/tenure track positions at various institutions such as UCLA, University of Cambridge (England), University of Texas, University of Utah, Montana State University (Bozeman), Northern Illinois University, University of Iowa, CSU San Marcos, California State Polytechnic University (Pomona), Pennsylvania State University, CSU Northridge, San Diego State and Pasadena City College.

Positions held by psychology graduates include: Director of the Claremont Aerospace Psychology Lab; Head and Chair of the Department of Human Development and Family Studies at Penn. State University; Director of MFT program at CSU Pomona; and Assistant Vice Chancellor for Graduate Studies at UCLA.

Graduates of the music program hold positions in the Detroit Symphony and Los Angeles Philharmonic; sing with the Los Angeles Opera, and several European Opera Companies.

A psychology graduate recently worked on the Coast Community Colleges' educational program, "Psychology: The Human Experience" (broadcast on PBS stations across the U.S. and Canada), for which he won an Emmy.

Sidonie Squier, MA in Communication Studies is the Director of Welfare and Food Stamps for the State of Florida working directly for the Governor.

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Last, but not the least, Kamala Gurung, after graduating from CSULB, will be the first speech language pathologist in Nepal.



- Initial survey performed by then Dean of Graduate Studies Ron Vogel in spring 2001 initial assessment of graduate advisor "top ten" issues
- Detailed survey then developed in spring 2002 by Ron Vogel
- Survey administered on trial basis in spring 2002, then again in spring 2003, by then Dean of Graduate Studies Beth Ambos
- 32 of 66 graduate advisors responded to detailed survey (~50% response)
