- Language Use: Used since 1786 when deaf schools began. Dialect used in schools differs from adult use outside. Interpreters required in court; some provided for college students and important public events.
- Language Development: Films. TV. Videos. Dictionary.
- Other Comments: 70 working sign language interpreters (2014 EUD). Sign language instruction for parents of deaf children."
