I. Course description: ACCT 610 Advanced Cost Accounting, Budgeting and Control

Prerequisites: ACCT 500 or equivalent with a grade of "C" or better. Problems in planning, budgeting and cost control for decision making from a quantitative analysis approach with emphasis on evaluation of the accounting information system. Laboratory and/or class computer applications are a requirement of the course. Not open to students with credit in ACCT 510.

II. **Text: *Introduction to Management Accounting*, 15th Ed, Chapters 1-17. Horngren et. al. Prentice Hall, 2011. ISBN 978-0-13-610277-9 (The "online edition" is highly recommended rather than the printed version)**

III. **Course objectives:** Advanced Cost Accounting, Budgeting and Control is the managerial accounting class for graduate students. The course focuses on providing accounting information for decision making for internal users (managers and others within the business entity). Students will become familiar with the four primary uses of managerial accounting information: planning, decision-making, control of costs and preparation and analysis of reports. In addition, the student will learn how managerial accounting information is utilized to evaluate performance.

IV. **Description of Assignments:** Assignment will focus on two areas:

- a. The development of quantitative and technical skills necessary to analyze, interpret and communicate with managers in order to improve business performance and
- b. The ability of students to effectively utilize these skills in decision making functions.

V. **Classroom procedures and attendance policy:** The class involves lecture and student participation each meeting. Students are expected to have read the assigned material prior to class and be prepared to participate in class discussions. Failure to attend class and materially participate in the assigned tasks will materially affect your grade. Students will be called upon to present homework assignments in each class.

VI. **Academic Integrity:** Cheating of any kind will result in referral to the appropriate University disciplinary authority.

VII. **Withdrawal or drop policy:** Students may drop at ANY TIME PRIOR TO THE FINAL DROP DATE (see current catalog).

Registering for MyAccountingLab

MyAccountingLab is a dynamic, interactive eLearning program. I have requested that you have access to this online program.

To access your MyAccountingLab online course for the first time, you need to register and log in. Whenever you want to use MyAccountingLab after that, you just need to log in. You can do both from the same starting point, at www.myaccountinglab.com.

How to register for MyAccountingLab:

To register, you will need a student access code and a course ID.

If you purchased a new textbook, it should have come with a Student Access Kit that contains a code you can use to register. If you do not have a Student Access Kit, you can purchase access online with a major credit card.

1. Go to www.myaccountinglab.com and click the Student button, in the Register section.
