## Using Primary Sources Mrs. James Smith's (Elizabeth Murray) Portrait (1769) Courtesy, Museum of Fine Arts, Boston

Before the invention of photography, the main way to preserve a person's likeness was to have a portrait done. Yet very few people in colonial America had their portraits painted. There were not very many artists who were good at painting realistic images of people. Also, portraits were expensive, a luxury good. One famous artist in Boston, John Singleton Copley, painted the portraits of many well-to-do colonists, including famous Revolutionary leaders like Paul Revere. In that portrait, Revere holds a silver teapot, an example of his skill as a silversmith. Other men were painted with account books or other objects that suggested their occupations. In the late summer of 1769, soon after her husband James Smith had died and before she went to England, Elizabeth Murray sat for this Copley portrait, which now hangs in the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston.
