Colonial portraits captured special moments in a few people's lives. However, there were not many artists with the talent to paint people's likenesses well. Some people had silhouettes made of themselves. But a real portrait was much rarer and much more expensive. Elizabeth Murray had her portrait painted at age 43 by a famous colonial artist, John Singleton Copley, on the eve of her departure for England following her husband James's death. She wanted to leave her family a special remembrance of her.
