# LONG BEACH STATE Commercial Music/Jazz Studies

The Long Beach State Commercial Music/Jazz Studies program has a history of excellence since its inception in 1974 as the first state-supported university program of its kind on the west coast. The program has received local, national, and international recognition of excellence through numerous appearances at jazz festivals, educational conventions and command performances, and its ensembles and soloists have consistently earned the highest honors and awards at music festivals throughout the United States, Canada, and Europe.

Some of the more notable performances by Long Beach State Studio Ensembles have included the Montreux lazz Festival (Switzerland), the North Sea Jazz Festival (Holland), the Playboy Jazz Festival, the International Association of Jazz Educators (IAIE) Convention, the International Trumpet Guild (ITG) Convention, the Music Educators National Conference (MENC), the California Music Educators Association (CMEA) Convention, the Long Beach Grand Proc the Long Beach Jazz Festival (Including 1994), the Dorothy Chandler Pavilion, the Long Beach Terrace Theater, the Long Beach Amphitheater, and Disneyland.
