#### IMPRO-VOZ

IMPRO-VOZ recorded a CD in the spring of '92 that also featured the CSULB Jazz Band I. All of the vocal jazz arrangements on the CD were written by either students or faculty of CSULB. IMPRO-VOZ was invited to perform for the International Association of Jazz Educators Convention in washington, DC in 1991, and performed with the Long Beach Ballet in the spring of 1991. It was the international premier of a new ballet called, "The Unicorn" by a New York composer.

#### Michele Weir

Michele is currently a faculty member at the University of Southern California and California State University Long Beach. She was previously on the faculty of the Phil Mattson School and Spokane Falls Community College where she taught vocal jazz classes and jazz piano, harmony, improvisation and arranging. As a member of the vocal jazz group, "Phil Mattson and the P.M. Singers," Michele appeared as singer and arranger for their two albums including Grammy nominated, "Night in the City."

As a pianist, Michele has toured as the accompanist for singer Bobby Vinton as well as doing free-lance work around the Los Angeles area. Michele's arrangements are published with Hal Leonard, Jensen Publications and the U.N.C. Jazz Press, and her commissioned works are performed by professional and educational groups internationally including "Chanticleer" and "Beachfront Property."

Michele is currently in demand as a clinician and adjudicator and serves as co-chair of Vocal Jazz for the International Association of Jazz Educators. Michele is also about to release a new CD as a soloist with Phil Mattson on piano.

#### **Heather McMasters**

With a degree in Liberal Studies with a concentration in Music. Now a graduate student, Heather has been the director of Vocal Jazz II for the past three years and is a former member of Long Beach State's noted vocal jazz ensemble IMPRO-VOZ. She is a regular featured vocalist with Studio Jazz Ensemble I and performs professionally for studio recordings, variety shows, ensembles, and solo work at Knott's Berry Farm, Magic Mountain, and Disneyland. She is currently appearing as Belle in the Beauty and the Beast live stage show at Disneyland as well as being a member of the fine commercial music group Mere Image. Heather teaches private voice and has been an adjudicator at the well-known Fullerton College Jazz Festival.

### LONG BEACH STATE Commercial Music/Jazz Studies

The Long Beach State Commercial Music/Jazz Studies program has a history of excellence since its inception in 1974 as the first state-supported university program of its kind on the west coast. The program has received local, national, and international recognition of excellence through numerous appearances at jazz festivals, educational conventions and command performances, and its ensembles and soloists have consistently earned the highest honors and awards at music festivals throughout the United States, Canada, and Europe.

Some of the more notable performances by Long Beach State Studio Ensembles have included the Montreux Jazz Festival (Switzerland), the North Sea Jazz Festival (Holland), the Playboy Jazz Festival, the International Association of Jazz Educators (IAJE) Convention, the International Trumpet Guild (ITG) Convention, the Music Educators National Conference (MENC), the California Music Educators Association (CMEA) Convention, the Long Beach Grand Prix, the Long Beach Jazz Festival (including 1994), the Dorothy Chandler Pavilion, the Long Beach Terrace Theater, the Long Beach Amphitheater, and Disneyland.
